Key achievements to date until July 2022:	Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:
 Our school Twitter account and 'Bebington Sport' newsletters. We have continued to develop staff knowledge and skills in the planning and delivery of the PE curriculum with the support of specialist teachers from Coop Academy Bebington. Successful 'Deep Dive' into PE with our School Improvement Partner. Extracurricular clubs have been re-established over the course of the year and include: gymnastics, dodgeball, athletics, judo, basketball, tennis, football, yoga and dance. Continued participation in competitive sporting activities including Sports Day, Wirral Primary School Games and cluster competitions. Sports Day re-established and parent/carer spectators invited. The school celebrated and promoted the B22 Commonwealth Games which included workshops for all classes comprising of various sports including wheelchair basketball. Catch Up Swimming for our Year 6 cohort has been implemented. As a result of Covid 19, the children have missed two years of school swimming and so it was important to target these children. Continued active involvement with Wirral School Games- class teachers award 'PE Star of the Term' to pupils who reflect the spirit of the School Games.
